What is a community foundation?

First created in 1914 by a banker at Cleveland Trust Company inspired to create a "community chest" that could help generous residents make sure their philanthropic dollars did good in the community.

Today there are 900+ active community foundations across the US representing philanthropic assets of more than \$140 billion.



But what do you do?

Community foundations are tax-exempt public charities that partner with individuals, businesses and foundations to receive charitable donations, manage philanthropic assets and make grants through a variety of diverse platforms including donor advised funds and scholarship funds.

In addition to grantmaking, community foundations support their communities in many other ways. For example, GHCF provides leadership in addressing critical community needs such as disaster relief and recovery efforts and initiatives like *Understanding Houston*, a comprehensive regional indicators project that enables data-informed decision-making.


Application Tips

- Only <u>COMPLETE</u> and <u>SUBMITTED</u> applications will be reviewed


